Member Mann supports Clerk Martinez-Roach's concern. He suggested that someone take a look at best practices at neighboring districts and that maybe CSBA could offer some wisdom on this. He understandings her concern and shares it.

President Herrera indicated that it is a legitimate discussion to have. Vice President Shirakawa does not mind looking at the policies, but does mind the Board getting into some kind of structured rotation. Teams change from year-to-year. The Board should have flexibility. He does not feel it is necessary to be locked in. He is willing to look at the policy, but not lock into something.

Member Mann has an NSBA publication that suggests not being lock into a rotation, but it should be based on leadership skills and ability. He will bring in the publication and share it with the Board.

Clerk Martinez Roach asked Legal Counsel if it is legal for Members to call or solicit each other on the telephone or e-mail a vote prior to a public meeting.

Legal Counsel indicated that it depends on the nature and content of the conversation or the communication. Legal Counsel indicated that the issue Member Martinez Roach was speaking about was the issue of serial communications. Even though only two people may be involved, they are serial in nature in that there is an understanding or an expressed representation that a third person will be contacted. Those such communications are prohibited by the Brown Act to the extent they involve the exchange of information that would be deliberative in nature in terms of a decision that this Board is going to make. The analysis under the Brown Act on those types of issues always beings with the substance and nature, actual substance of the communication itself. The answer is that it depends on what is actually said or what is actually being communications. Clerk Martinez Roach gave a scenario where one Board Member called another and then the second Board Member sends an e-mail to another. Is that a quorum?

Legal Counsel indicated that it was no necessarily a quorum. It depends what is in the second communication in term of are they articulating or communicating decisions, comments or impressions shared by other people.

Clerk Martinez Roach stated that there had to be specific language. Legal Counsel said, "Yes."

President Herrera would like to see this come back possibly in May after the budget and other items are handled at upcoming Board meetings.

Clerk Martinez Roach indicated that she did not want to wait until May.

President Herrera felt that since they were not going to vote on this again until December, there was no urgency to bring it back prior to May.

Clerk Martinez Roach felt that waiting until May would lead further postponements beyond the month of May.

Vice President Shirakawa felt there was no urgency, as long as it was brought back for discussion.

	Member Nguyen indicated that each Board Member is here to do their work for the District and students. Regarding the Board's own elections, everyone has someone they feel comfortable with in leading them. # EAST SIDE UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT ATHLETIC CODE OF CONDUCT

Each school will have one athletic council consisting of all head coaches, athletic directors and administrators.

## **MISSION STATEMENT:**

We are representatives of ESUHSD athletic department/program. Our purpose is to create uniformity throughout the district, establish district standards, establish district goals, and ensure that athletics is a co-curricular activity and a supplement to the educational process. We will accomplish this by seeing that there is greater communication between stakeholders (parents, community, athletes, coaches and school staff), and by being accountable (each school will be responsible for the distribution of the athletic code of conduct to the athletes and his/her parents).

**CORE VALUES:** 

Our goal is to develop the student/athlete to become a productive citizen in society by utilizing teamwork, sportsmanship, physical development, socialization skills and critical thinking skills in a safe educational environment.

# CODE OF CONDUCT OFFENSES AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

A) Player who quits a team without coach's release: Player must sit out the remainder of that sport season including practices with the next sport and the athlete may not suit up. The athlete becomes eligible to compete the second Monday of league play.

B) Substance abuse: Any athlete found in possession of drugs, alcoholic beverages, alcoholic beverage bottles, (whether empty or full), drug paraphernalia and/or the use, consumption, distribution, and/or being under the influence of drugs, hallucinogenic drugs, or narcotics, (except when expressly prescribed by a physician) will be declared ineligible for competition for two weeks upon their return to school. The athlete is responsible to find a substance abuse program and provide proof of rehabilitation.

C) Theft: For grand theft, immediate suspension from the team and ineligible for athletic participation for 180 school days from the date of infraction.For petty theft, any athlete found guilty will be declared ineligible for competition for two weeks upon their return to school.

D) Athlete dismissed from a team: After review with the appropriate athletic director, the athlete must sit out the remainder of that sport season including practices with the next sport and the athlete may not suit up. The athlete becomes eligible to compete the second Monday of league play.

E) Game ejection: See B.V.A.L. bylaws

**F**) Suspension by a coach: - Follow these procedures: Coach notifies athlete, parent, athletic director, and administration in writing within 2 school days as to the

offense. Letter to include length of suspension, date of occurrence, and any additional stipulations required by the coach before reinstatement.

G) Athletes who commit a misdemeanor or felony: Athletes who commit a misdemeanor or felony during a sport season will receive immediate suspension from the team and are ineligible for athletic participation for 180 school days from the date of infraction or until acquitted or charges are dropped.

H) Athletes transferring from one school to another: Athletes transferring from one school to another are required to provide a transfer form signed by the previous school's athletic director and APA before he/she will be allowed to compete. Any sanctions from the previous school will be carried over to the new school.

I) Infraction carryover to another sport: When an athlete has committed an infraction in one sport, the infraction will be carried over to another sport as long as the following procedures are followed: Coach notifies athlete, parent, athletic director and administration in writing within 1 school day of the offense. Letter to include length of suspension, date of occurrence, and any additional stipulations required by the coach before reinstatement.

J) School issues resulting in suspensions: (i.e. insubordination, cutting, fighting etc.) – APA or advisor will inform the student/athlete that he/she is not allowed to participate for the duration of the penalty and will inform the coach and athletic director of the penalty within 24 hours.

K) Absence on the day of competition: The athlete must attend at least four periods or classes unless the above is a school-sponsored activity or there is an extenuating circumstance approved by the coach and an administrator.

L) Athletic trial period: An athlete has a two-week trial period during which he/she may quit an athletic team without penalty. The two-week period begins with the first day of official attendance by the athlete.

M) An athlete may not start practice with another school sports team until: An athlete may not attend practice with any other team until his/her last league, regional, sectional, or state meet in which the athlete is involved is completed.

N) Athletes must turn in equipment: Athletes must turn in their equipment or pay for replacement within five school days after completion of his/her season. Athletes who do not comply will be immediately suspended from any team.

O) An athlete will be allowed to have a rest period: An athlete will be allowed to have a rest period of three school days at the end of the previous sport season before beginning his/her try-outs period without penalty.

P) Each sport team or program will create rules and regulations: Each sport team or program will create the rules and regulations of their team and distribute it to the athletes, parents, athletic directors and administration before enforcement will be supported.

**Q)** Smoking: An athlete who is caught smoking or in possession of tobacco will

face school discipline consisting of being cited by police, enrolled in a Saturday program and will miss one athletic contest.

The athletic council supports the rules and regulations set down by the individual coach as long as the rules and regulations are within the scope of the school, district, league, CCS and CIF rules and regulations, and the right of that coach to discipline team members accordingly.

Our thirty-day summer school program, that begins June 16, and ends July 28, 2005, will be available again for students in grades 9-12. Supported by the State of California, the state reimbursed classes include: make-up classes for 9<sup>th</sup> grade students at risk of being retained in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade, special classes for students in danger of failing the High School Exit Exam, classes for 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students who have failed subjects needed for graduation and for certain students in Special Education. The State reimbursed classes are listed below:

English/Language Arts	Mathematics
Science	Social Science
Reading	English Language Development (ELD)
High School Exit Exam Preparation	

The estimated reimbursement from the state will continue to be on an hourly basis at the rate of \$3.53 per student hour of attendance. Our estimate of this year's enrollment is 471 sections. This number could change depending on the student sign-ups.

Additionally, the Governor's budget allows for enrichment classes at all grade levels. The number of classes that can be offered is capped based on the District's 2004 CBED's enrollment. Based on the state formula, the District can offer enrichment classes to approximately 900 students. This funding will be used to offer courses in the identified core academic areas as well as some elective areas consistent with the District's Graduation Requirements. These sections will also be funded at \$3.53 per pupil hour of attendance. The courses offered will be from the following academic areas:

English/Language Arts	Mathematics
Science	Social Science
Foreign Language	Fine Arts
Computer Education	ELD

## A description of some of the summer school programs are described below:

## 1. ELL Summer School

The goal is to increase the English skills of our ELL students in reading, speaking and writing to a level high enough to pass the CELDT assessment at the proficient and advanced levels. The extra support that summer school can provide will also help these students become more successful in the core curriculum classes preventing them from falling behind in meeting the graduation requirements. This summer school program is part of the CAHSEE preparation program that is a reimbursement program from the State.

## 2. <u>Enrichment</u>

Each school will receive student slots equaling 5% of their CBED's enrollment, as of October 2004. We project 900 students will be able to take advantage of enrichment classes. These classes are to be used by magnet, academy and other special programs, such as AVID and Puente students who need to take extra elective classes during the school year required by those program models. Other students can apply, if room is available only if they are taking a higher-level course at the school site. Principals will make this decision for each individual student. The site must get the district's approval for each section offered.

## 3. <u>Make-up Classes</u>

We are recommending that schools give priority for students needing to make-up required courses for graduation at the  $9^{th}$  and  $10^{th}$  grade levels. Students in the  $11^{th}$  and  $12^{th}$  grades who need classes for graduation will also be a priority.

## 4. <u>Special Education</u>

Special Education classes will be held for Special Day Class (SDC) students whose Individual Educational Plan (IEP) call for extended year services. The RSP or mainstreamed students can attend the regular make-up summer school program if needed. Funding for the LF and SDC students is provided by the State allocation for Special Education.

## 5. <u>Migrant Education</u>

Basic skills development classes in language arts and mathematics will be offered to identified migrant education students at selected sites. Additionally, migrant education students will participate in a work experience program after their regular morning classes. Funds are budgeted by Migrant Education for this purpose.

## 6. <u>The Valdes Project</u>

The Valdes Summer Math Institute will again be available to students from our feeder schools in 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. The operation of this project has been a cooperative effort among feeder school districts. The goals of the program are to prepare students for Algebra 1 enrollment upon entering high school, reduce the risk of students dropping out of school, and guarantee success in a major academic discipline. It is anticipated that the project will be housed at various local colleges and universities. The enrollment will consist of approximately 1,000 students. Valdes will charge for enrichment classes. All other classes will be summer make-up and qualify for state reimbursement.

## 7. Language Arts/Math Summer Institute

This program was developed and implemented in the summer of 1999. It has been highly successful and thus it will be expanded for the 2005 summer session. The goal of this program is to better prepare incoming students for courses in Algebra 1 and English 1. Key components of the program are classes team-taught by two teachers (one middle school and one high school), using an integrated Algebra/English curriculum, teacher training, and collaboration with the UC Santa Cruz New Teacher Center, California Post-Secondary Education Commission and Applied Materials.

#### PROPOSED

East Side Union High School District Board Policy BP 5131.6 Students

Alcohol And Other Drugs

East Side Union High School District recognizes that students unsanctioned use of chemical substances, including alcohol, is illegal. The use of such substances is detrimental to individual development and undermines effective education. The use of chemical substances often leads to chemical dependency, an illness, requiring intervention and treatment. The Governing Board is concerned for the safety, health, and well-being of its students. Therefore, to ensure the highest standards for learning in the classroom, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a comprehensive prevention program that includes instruction, intervention, recovering student support, enforcement/discipline, activities that promote the involvement of parents/guardians, and coordination with appropriate community agencies and organizations. The Superintendent or designee shall clearly communicate to students, staff and parents/guardians all Board policies, regulations, procedures and school rules related to this prevention program. Special efforts shall be made to ensure that these materials are understood by parents/guardians and students of limited literacy or limited English proficiency.

The instructional programs will help students obtain and use current and accurate information, develop and maintain a positive self-concept, take positive actions to cope with stress, and use appropriate social and personal skills to resist involvement with alcohol and other drugs.

The curriculum will be K-8, comprehensive and sequential in nature and suited to meet the needs of students at their respective grade levels.

The Board encourages staff to display attitudes which make them positive role models for students with regard to alcohol and other drugs. Staff should help students see themselves as responsible partners in efforts to maintain a safe, constructive school climate.

All instruction and related materials shall stress the concept of "no unlawful use" of alcohol or other drugs and shall not include the concept of "responsible use" when such use is illegal.

The Board recognizes that there are students on our campuses who use alcohol and other drugs and can benefit from intervention. The Board supports intervention programs that include the involvement of students, parents/guardians and community agencies/organizations.

The Board finds it essential that school personnel be trained to identify symptoms which may indicate use of alcohol and other drugs. The responsibilities of staff in working with, intervening, and reporting students suspected of alcohol and other drug use shall be clearly defined in administrative regulations.

Administrative regulations shall also identify the roles and responsibilities of law enforcement staff as reflected in procedures which the district and law enforcement agency have established for the coordinated alcohol and drug prevention intervention system. Law enforcement staff shall receive copies of all Board policies, regulations, procedures and school rules related to this program.

Students and parents/guardians shall be informed about the signs of alcohol and other drug use and about appropriate agencies offering counseling.

#### Non-punitive Self-Referral

The Board strongly encourages any student who is using alcohol or drugs to discuss the matter with his/her parent/guardian or with any staff member. If the student is uncomfortable doing this, he/she is encouraged to ask a friend to discuss the problem with a parent/guardian or staff member. Students who disclose past use of alcohol or other drugs when seeking help from an intervention or recovery program shall not be punished or disciplined for such past use.

#### **Recovering Student Support**

The Board recognizes the presence of recovering students in the schools and the necessity to support these students in avoiding reinvolvement with alcohol and other drugs. The Board shall provide ongoing school activities which enhance recovery.

#### Enforcement/Discipline

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action to eliminate possession, use or sale of alcohol and other drugs and related paraphernalia on school grounds, at school events, or in any situation in which the school is responsible for the conduct and well-being of students. Students possessing, selling and/or using alcohol or other drugs or related paraphernalia shall be subject to disciplinary procedures which may result in suspension or expulsion.

School authorities may search students and school properties for the possession of alcohol and other drugs as long as such searches are conducted in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulations.

#### **Cell Phones**

In accordance with Education Code 48901.5, personal electronic signaling devices on all East Side Union High School District school campuses are subject to regulation from the first warning bell through the final bell of the school day. These personal electronic signal devices include but are not limited to pagers, beepers and cellular/digital telephones.

Personal electronic devices may be carried by students, but must be kept out of sight, i.e., in a purse or backpack, and must be turned off. Devices left on that disturb the educational setting are subject to confiscation and the student subject to discipline.

Students may not utilize personal communication devices on campus during the day while classes are in session. This includes concurrent classes, after-school detention and Saturday School.

The administration of an individual school site may decide that personal electronic devices may be used by students during brunch and lunch. Students at sites where this specific usage is approved must recognize that inappropriate use of these devices during lunch or brunch may result in their confiscation and the student being subject to discipline.

Violations of this policy may result in the device being confiscated and returned only to a parent/guardian. Once confiscated by site staff, the device must be accounted for until it is returned to the parent/guardian.

Any violations of this policy are subject to discipline in accordance with the progressive discipline for "Defiance" on the District Discipline Chart.

No student shall be prohibited from possessing or using an electronic signaling device that is determined by a licensed physician or surgeon to be essential for the student's health and the use of which, is limited to health-related purposes. The student must have the doctor's note on file with the school.
