#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Governing Board East Side Union High School District San Jose, California

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the East Side Union High School District (the "District") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and *Standards and Procedures for Audits of California K-12 Local Educational Agencies 2009-10*, issued by the California Education Audit Appeals Panel as regulations. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the East Side Union High School District, as of June 30, 2010, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated December 15, 2010, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The required supplementary information, such as management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison and other postemployment information, is not a required part of the basic financial statements, but is supplementary information required by the accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information listed in the table of contents, including the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards which is required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of State, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2010

This section of East Side Union High School District's (District) annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the District's financial performance during the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2010. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which immediately follows this section.

#### OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### The Financial Statements

The financial statements presented herein include all of the activities of the District and its component units using the integrated approach as prescribed by GASB Statement Number 34.

The Government-Wide Financial Statements present the financial picture of the District from the economic resources measurement focus using the accrual basis of accounting. They present governmental activities and business-type activities separately. These statements include all assets of the District as well as all liabilities (including long-term obligations). Additionally, certain eliminations have occurred as prescribed by the statement in regards to interfund activity, payables and receivables.

The Fund Financial Statements include statements for each of the three categories of activities: governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary.

The Governmental Funds are prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting.

The Proprietary Funds are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting.

The Fiduciary Funds are agency funds, which are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting.

Reconciliation of the Fund Financial Statements to the Government-Wide Financial Statements is provided to explain the differences created by the integrated approach.

The Primary unit of the government is the East Side Union High School District.

#### FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST YEAR

The following major financial highlights of the current year are:

- The enrollment reported in the current fiscal year's California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS) for the District was 25,003, which is a decrease of 49 while P2 ADA was 23,633, which is an increase of 75 from the prior year by using ADA recovery strategies.
- The District received an additional 4.25% cost of living adjustment to their revenue limit (COLA). With the ADA increase, the District received \$7.4 million in additional revenue limit. However, revenue limit was reduced by 18.36% deficit factor or \$32.5 million and a one-time basis adjustment of \$253 per ADA which resulted in an additional \$6.0 million reduction in revenue limit over the deficit factor. The overall impact to the District was a reduction in revenue limit in the amount of \$31.1 million.

- The District received \$203,041 in additional funding (5.91% increase from the prior year) in Title I funding and No Child Left Behind Program Improvement.
- The District received \$470,493 less than in the prior year in Targeted Instructional Improvement Grant funding.
- The District received \$15 million for ARRA-State Fiscal Stabilization Fund and spent \$12.2 million as of June 30, 2010.
- With the anticipated receivable, the District would receive \$3.9 million for ARRA-IDEA for Special Education and spent \$3.9 million as of June 30, 2010.
- The District received \$2.4 million for ARRA-Title I Entitlement and spent \$2.4 million as of June 30, 2010.
- Special Education SELPA revenue dropped by \$452,049 in the current year.
- The District reduced its workforce due to the budget reduction by the State. The District employs 1,093
   FTE Certificated Union employees; 491 FTE Classified Union employees and 69 FTE Administrative/Management employees by General Fund.
- All employees had a 0% salary increase and an average of 14.8% increase in medical benefits
- The District has installed solar panels to generate renewable energy in six schools:

  Andrew Hill, Evergreen Valley, Foothill, Independence, Santa Teresa and W.C. Overfelt.
- The District plans to install solar panels to the rest of the schools in 2010-11.
- The District Measures G and E had completed the following projects in 2010:
  - Oak Grove Title IX Field Work-Scoreboard in the amount of \$8,294.
  - Evergreen Valley High School PE Teaching Stations in the amount of \$1,535,155.

#### REPORTING THE DISTRICT AS A WHOLE

#### The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities report information about the District as a whole and about its activities. These statements include all assets and liabilities of the District using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the District's net assets and changes in them. Net assets are the difference between assets and liabilities, one way to measure the District's financial health, or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in the District's net assets are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Other factors to consider are changes in the District's property tax base and the condition of the District's facilities.

The relationship between revenues and expenses is the District's operating results. Since the board's responsibility is to provide services to our students and not to generate profit as commercial entities do, one must consider other factors when evaluating the overall health of the District. The quality of the education and the safety of our schools will likely be an important component in this evaluation.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2010

In the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities, we separate the District activities as follows:

Governmental activities - Most of the District's services are reported in this category. This includes the education of nine through twelve grade students, adult education students, the operation of child development activities, and the on-going effort to improve and maintain buildings and sites. Property taxes, state income taxes, user fees, interest income, federal, state and local grants, as well as general obligation bonds, finance these activities.

Business-type activities - The District charges fees to help it cover the costs of certain services it provides. The District's food services are included in the Business-type activities.

#### REPORTING THE DISTRICT'S MOST SIGNIFICANT FUNDS

#### **Fund Financial Statements**

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds - not the District as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law and by bond covenants. However, management establishes many other funds to help it control and manage money for particular purposes or to show that it is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, and other money that it receives from the U.S. and State Department of Education.

Governmental funds - Most of the District's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual basis of accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the District's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs. The differences of results in the governmental fund financial statements to those in the government-wide financial statements are explained in a reconciliation following each governmental funds financial statement.

Proprietary funds - When the District charges users for the services it provides, whether to outside customers or to other departments within the District, these services are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way that all activities are reported in the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities. In fact, the District's enterprise funds are the same as the business-type activities we report in the government-wide statements but provide more detail and additional information, such as cash flows, for proprietary funds. We use internal service funds (the other component of proprietary funds) to report activities that provide supplies and services for the District's other programs and activities - such as the District's Self-Insurance Fund. The internal service funds are reported with governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2010

#### THE DISTRICT AS TRUSTEE

#### Reporting the District's Fiduciary Responsibilities

The District is the trustee, or fiduciary, for funds held on behalf of others, like our funds for associated student body activities and scholarships. The District's fiduciary activities are reported in the Statements of Fiduciary Net Assets. We exclude these activities from the District's other financial statements because the District cannot use these assets to finance its operations. The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used for their intended purposes.

#### THE DISTRICT AS A WHOLE

#### **Net Assets**

The District's net assets were \$74.0 and \$64.4 million for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2010 and 2009, respectively. Restricted net assets are reported separately to show legal constraints from debt covenants and enabling legislation that limits the School Board's ability to use those net assets for day-to-day operations. Our analysis below focuses on the net assets (Table 1) and change in net assets (Table 2) of the District's governmental activities.

#### Governmental Activities

As reported in the Statement of Activities in the audited financial statements, the cost of all of our governmental activities this year was \$273.0 million. However, the amount that our taxpayers ultimately financed for these activities through local taxes and other unrestricted revenues was only \$216.5 million because the cost was paid by those who benefited from the programs (\$0.2 million) or by other governments and organizations who subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions (\$56.3 million). We paid for the remaining "public benefit" portion of our governmental activities with \$125.2 million in taxes, and the remaining in State and Federal funds and with other revenues, like interest and general entitlements.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2010

In Table 3, we have presented the net cost of each of the District's largest functions - regular program instruction and instruction related services, pupil services, maintenance and operations, administration and interest and other. As discussed above, net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the District's taxpayers by each of these functions. Providing this information allows our citizens to consider the cost of each function in comparison to the benefits they believe are provided by that function.

#### THE DISTRICT'S FUNDS

As the District completed this year, our governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$248.7 million, which was an increase of \$71.3 million from last year.

#### General Fund Budgetary Highlights

Over the course of the year, the District revises its budget as it attempts to deal with unexpected changes in revenues and expenditures. The final amendment to the budget was adopted on June 22, 2010. (A schedule showing the District's original and final budget amounts compared with amounts actually paid and received is provided in our annual report).

The General Fund is the principal operating fund for the District. It is used to account for the ordinary operations of the District. The District received a 4.25% cost of living adjustment with an 18.355% deficit factor attachment and a one-time basis adjustment of \$253 per ADA or a net reduction of \$31.1 million to the General Fund. In addition, the District experienced a decline in its enrollment of 49. Other highlights includes receiving \$470,493 less in Targeted Instructional Improvement Grant funding, a 5.91% increase in Title I funding in the amount of \$203,041 with also an additional \$1.15 million in Stimulus funding, an additional \$5.65 million in Stimulus State Fiscal Stabilization funding, an additional \$1.4 million in Stimulus Special Education funding. As a result of the above factors, excluding the general reserve, the General Fund unrestricted fund balance decreased by \$1.8 million.

#### CAPITAL ASSET & DEBT ADMINISTRATION

#### Capital Assets

At June 30, 2010, the District governmental activities had \$465.3 million in a broad range of capital assets, including land, buildings, and furniture and equipment. This amount represents a net increase (including additions, deductions and depreciation) of \$42.5 million, or 10.0 percent, from last year. There were no significant changes in business-type activities capital assets.

The District's general obligation bond rating is "A." The State limits the amount of general obligation debt that Districts can issue to 1.25 percent of the assessed value of all taxable property within the district's boundaries. The District's outstanding general obligation debt of \$602.7 million is below the statutorily imposed limit.

Other obligations include compensated absences payable and other long-term obligations. We present more detailed information regarding our long-term liabilities in Note 8 of the financial statements.

# MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS JUNE 30, 2010

#### SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF FISCAL YEAR 2009-2010 ARE NOTED BELOW:

The District performance on the California Standards Test (CST) demonstrated improvement this year. Most grades increased performance in the different content areas. Grade 9 showed a 3 year trend of improvement in English Language Arts. As of the number of 9<sup>th</sup> graders taking Algebra II has increased, performance has also continued to increase. There was a 4% gain in the percent of students scoring proficient in Integrated Science I and East Side students performed above the state average in Physics at all grade levels. The District monitors the performance of subgroups in the District to measure the District's progress in closing the achievement gap. The goal is to close the gap while maintaining positive change for all subgroups from year to year. East Side showed a 9% gain over the last four years in English Language Arts and a 3% gain over the last four years in Mathematics in the percent of students passing the CAHSEE. The District showed significant gains in CAHSEE English Language Arts passing rates but CAHSEE Mathematics passing rates stayed about the same. East Side showed minimal gains on the California Standards Tests. The District will continue to monitor closing the achievement gap and increase the percent of students graduating high school. The District has built solar panels to generate renewable energy in six schools and planns to finish the solar panels to all schools in 2010-11.

#### ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

In considering the District Budget for the 2010-2011 year, the District Board and management made the several assumptions. Among those assumptions is that the State will provide the general fund revenue limit cost of living adjustment (COLA) by 0% but reduce the revenue limit by a 17.963% deficit factor. The District will receive additional Federal Education Job Grant that will save certificated and classified employee jobs and assist the District in balancing its budget. The District will continue to provide a limited Summer Program for Special Education and credit make-ups. Special Education SELPA revenues are projected to decrease by \$500 thousand. The District will maintain its increased class size of 3 additional students per classroom. Certificated bargaining unit members will reduce their pay by taking 5 furlough days. Administrators and managers are taking a 2.75% pay cut. Certificated bargaining unit members, administrators and managers are paying more co-pay for doctor visits and prescription to lower medical benefit cost for the District.

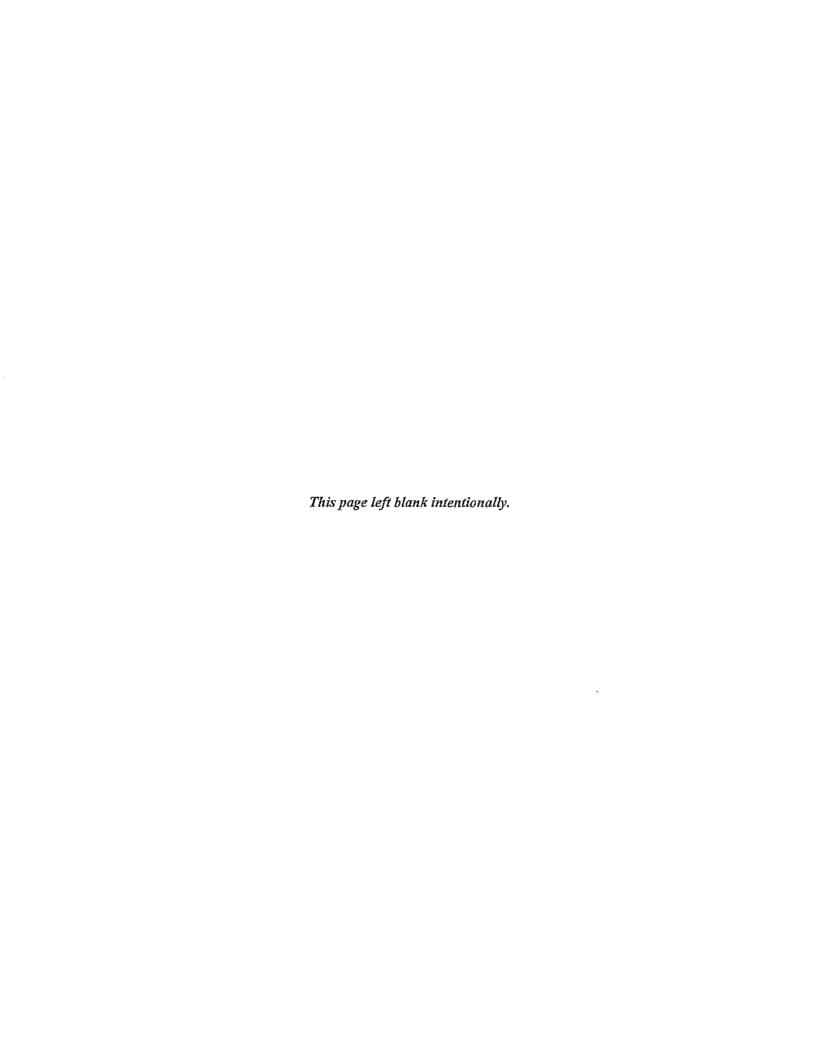

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2010

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Financial Reporting Entity

The East Side Union High School District was organized in 1949 under the laws of the State of California. The District operates under a locally-elected five-member Board form of government and provides educational services to grades 9-12 as mandated by the State and/or Federal agencies. The District operates 11 high schools, 3 adult education sites, 1 independent study program, 4 continuation schools and 8 child care center.

A reporting entity is comprised of the primary government, component units, and other organizations that are included to ensure the financial statements are not misleading. The primary government of the District consists of all funds, departments, boards, and agencies that are not legally separate from the District. For the District, this includes general operations, food service, and student related activities of the District. The District determined that there are no potential component units that meet the criteria for inclusion within the reporting entity.

#### Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

The accounting system is organized and operated on a fund basis. A fund is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts, which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions, or limitations. The District's funds are grouped into three broad fund categories: governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary.

Governmental Funds Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions typically are financed. Governmental fund reporting focuses on the sources, uses, and balances of current financial resources. Expendable assets are assigned to the various governmental funds according to the purposes for which they may or must be used. Current liabilities are assigned to the fund from which they will be paid. The difference between governmental fund assets and liabilities is reported as fund balance. The following are the District's major governmental funds:

#### Major Governmental Funds

General Fund The General Fund is the chief operating fund for all districts. It is used to account for the ordinary operations of a district. All transactions except those required or permitted by law to be in another fund are accounted for in this fund.

Building Fund The Building Fund exists primarily to account separately for proceeds from the sale of bonds (Education Code Section 15146) and may not be used for any purposes other than those for which the bonds were issued.

Bond Interest and Redemption Fund The Bond Interest and Redemption Fund is used for the repayment of bonds issued for a district (Education Code sections 15125-15262).

#### Non-Major Governmental Funds

Special Revenue Funds The Special Revenue Funds are established to account for the proceeds from specific revenue sources (other than trusts or for major capital projects) that are restricted to the financing of particular activities:

Adult Education Fund The Adult Education Fund is used to account separately for Federal, State, and local revenues for adult education programs and is to be expended for adult education purposes only, except for State revenues which, as a result of Senate Bill 4 of the 2009-10 Third Extraordinary Session (SBX3 4), may be used for any educational purpose.

Child Development Fund The Child Development Fund is used to account separately for Federal, State, and local revenues to operate child development programs and is to be used only for expenditures for the operation of child development programs.

Deferred Maintenance Fund The Deferred Maintenance Fund is used to account separately for State apportionments and the District's contributions for deferred maintenance purposes (Education Code sections 17582-17587) and for items of maintenance approved by the State Allocation Board, except for State apportionments which, as a result of Senate Bill 4 of the 2009-10 Third Extraordinary Session (SBX3 4), may be used for any educational purpose.

Special Reserve Fund for Other Than Capital Outlay Projects The Special Reserve Fund for Other Than Capital Outlay Projects is used primarily to provide for the accumulation of General Fund monies for general operating purposes other than for capital outlay (*Education Code* Section 42840).

Special Reserve Fund for Postemployment Benefits The Special Reserve Fund for Postemployment Benefits may be used pursuant to Education Code Section 42840 to account for amounts the District has earmarked for the future cost of postemployment benefits but has not contributed irrevocably to a separate trust for the postemployment benefit plan.

Capital Projects Funds The Capital Project funds are established to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities (other than those financed by proprietary funds and trust funds).

Capital Facilities Fund The Capital Facilities Fund is used primarily to account separately for monies received from fees levied on developers or other agencies as a condition of approving a development (Education Code sections 17620-17626). Expenditures are restricted to the purposes specified in Government Code sections 65970-65981 or to the items specified in agreements with the developer (Government Code Section 66006).

County School Facilities Fund The County School Facilities Fund is established pursuant to *Education Code* Section 17070.43 to receive apportionments from the 1998 State School Facilities Fund (Proposition IA), the 2002 State School Facilities Fund (Proposition 47), or the 2004 State School Facilities Fund (Proposition 55) authorized by the State Allocation Board for new school facility construction, modernization projects, and facility hardship grants, as provided in the Leroy F. Greene School Facilities Act of 1998 (*Education Code* Section 17070 et seq.).

State School Building Lease-Purchase Fund The State School Building Lease Purchase Fund is used primarily to account separately for State apportionments for the reconstruction, remodeling, or replacing of existing school buildings or the acquisition of new school sites and buildings, as provided in the Leroy F. Greene State School Building Lease-Purchase Law of 1976 (Education Code Section 17000 et seq.).

Proprietary Funds Proprietary fund reporting focuses on the determination of operating income, changes in net assets, financial position, and cash flows. The District applies all GASB pronouncements, as well as the Financial Accounting Standards Board pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. Proprietary funds are classified as enterprise or internal service. The District has the following proprietary funds:

Enterprise Fund Enterprise funds may be used to account for any activity for which a fee is charged to external users for goods or services. The only enterprise fund of the District accounts for the financial transactions related to the Food Service Operations of the District.

Internal Service Fund Internal service funds may be used to account for any activity for which services are provided to other funds of the District on a cost-reimbursement basis. The District operates a dental and vision insurance program that is accounted for in an internal service fund.

Fiduciary Funds Fiduciary fund reporting focuses on net assets and changes in net assets. The fiduciary fund category is split into four classifications: pension trust funds, investment trust funds, private-purpose trust funds, and agency funds.

The District operates trust and agency fund types. Agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations. Such funds have no equity accounts since all assets are due to individuals or entities at some future time. The District's agency fund accounts for student body activities (ASB). Trust funds are used to account for the assets held by the District under a trust agreement for individuals and therefore not available to support the District's own programs. The District's trust fund is the Student Scholarship Fund and Retiree Benefit Trust Fund.

#### **Basis of Accounting - Measurement Focus**

Government-Wide Financial Statements The government-wide statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. This is the same approach used in the preparation of the proprietary fund financial statements, but differs from the manner in which governmental fund financial statements are prepared.

The government-wide statement of activities presents a comparison between expenses, both direct and indirect, and program revenues for each segment of the business-type activities of the District and for each governmental program, and excludes fiduciary activity. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program, or department and are therefore clearly identifiable to a particular function. The District does not allocate indirect expenses to functions in the Statement of Activities. Program revenues include charges paid by the recipients of the goods or services offered by the programs and grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues are presented as general revenues. The comparison of program revenues and expenses identifies the extent to which each program or business segment is self-financing or draws from the general revenues of the District. Eliminations have been made to minimize the double counting of internal activities.

Net assets should be reported as restricted when constraints placed on net asset use are either externally imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. The net assets restricted for other activities result from special revenue funds and the restrictions on their net asset use.

Fund Financial Statements Fund financial statements report detailed information about the District. The focus of governmental and proprietary fund financial statements is on major funds rather than reporting funds by type. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column. The internal service and food service funds are presented in a single column on the face of the proprietary fund statements.

Governmental Funds All governmental funds are accounted for using a flow of current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. The statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance reports on the sources (revenues and other financing sources) and uses (expenditures and other financing uses) of current financial resources. This approach differs from the manner in which the governmental activities of the government-wide statements are prepared. Governmental fund financial statements therefore include reconciliations with brief explanations to better identify the relationship between the government-wide statements and governmental funds statements.

Proprietary Funds Proprietary funds are accounted for using a flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. All assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of this fund are included in the statement of net assets. The statement of changes in fund net assets presents increases (revenues) and decreases (expenses) in net total assets. The statement of cash flows provides information about how the District finances and meets the cash flow needs of its proprietary fund.

**Fiduciary Funds** Fiduciary funds are accounted for using the flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting.

Revenues – Exchange and Non-Exchange Transactions Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available. Available means that the resources will be collected within the current fiscal year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current fiscal year. Generally, available is defined as collectible within 45 or 60 days. However, to achieve comparability of reporting among California districts and so as not to distort normal revenue patterns, with specific respect to reimbursement grants and corrections to state-aid apportionments, the California Department of Education has defined available for districts as collectible within one year. The following revenue sources are considered to be both measurable and available at fiscal year end: State apportionments, interest, certain grants, and other local sources.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the District receives value without directly giving equal value in return, include property taxes, certain grants, entitlements, and donations. Revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year in which the taxes are received. Revenue from certain grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include time and purpose requirements. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must also be available before it can be recognized.

Deferred Revenue Deferred revenue arises when potential revenue does not meet both the "measurable" and "available" criteria for recognition in the current period or when resources are received by the District prior to the incurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when both revenue recognition criteria are met, or when the District has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for deferred revenue is removed from the combined balance sheet and revenue is recognized.

Certain grants received before the eligibility requirements are met are recorded as deferred revenue. On the governmental fund financial statements, receivables that will not be collected within the available period are also recorded as deferred revenue.

Expenses/Expenditures On the accrual basis of accounting, expenses are recognized at the time they are incurred. The measurement focus of governmental fund accounting is on decreases in net financial resources (expenditures) rather than expenses. Expenditures are generally recognized in the accounting period in which the related fund liability is incurred, if measurable, and typically paid within 90 days. Principal and interest on long-term obligations, which have not matured, are recognized when paid in the governmental funds as expenditures. Allocations of costs, such as depreciation and amortization, are not recognized in the governmental funds but are recognized in the government-wide statements.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The District's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition. Cash equivalents also include cash with county treasury balances for purposes of the statement of cash flows.

#### Investments

Investments held at June 30, 2010, with original maturities greater than one year are stated at fair value. Fair value is estimated based on quoted market prices at year-end. All investments not required to be reported at fair value are stated at cost or amortized cost. Fair values of investments in county and State investment pools are determined by the program sponsor.

### Prepaid Expenditures

Prepaid expenditures (expenses) represent amounts paid in advance of receiving goods or services. The District has the option of reporting expenditure in governmental funds for prepaid items either when purchased or during the benefiting period. The District has chosen to report the expenditures when incurred.

#### **Stores Inventories**

Inventories consist of expendable food and supplies held for consumption and unused donated commodities. Inventories are stated at cost, on the weighted average basis. The costs of inventory items are recorded as expenditures in the governmental type funds and expenses in the proprietary type funds when used.

### Capital Assets and Depreciation

The accounting and reporting treatment applied to the capital assets associated with a fund are determined by its measurement focus. In general, capital assets are long-lived assets of the District as a whole. The District maintains a capitalization threshold of \$5,000. The District does not possess any infrastructure. Improvements

are capitalized; the costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized, but are expensed as incurred.

When purchased, such assets are recorded as expenditures in the governmental funds and capitalized. The valuation basis for general capital assets are historical cost, or where historical cost is not available, estimated historical cost based on replacement cost. Donated capital assets are capitalized at estimated fair market value on the date donated.

Capital assets in the proprietary funds are capitalized in the fund in which they are utilized. The valuation basis for proprietary fund capital assets are the same as those used for the general capital assets.

Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives of the various classes of depreciable capital assets are as follows: buildings and improvements, 20 to 50 years; and equipment, 2 to 10 years.

#### Interfund Balances

On fund financial statements, receivables and payables resulting from short-term interfund loans are classified as "interfund receivables/payables." These amounts are eliminated in the governmental and business-type activities columns of the statement of net assets, except for the net residual amounts due between governmental and business-type activities, which are presented as internal balances.

### Compensated Absences

Compensated absences are accrued as a liability as the benefits are earned. The entire compensated absence liability is reported on the government-wide statement of net assets. For governmental funds, the current portion of unpaid compensated absences is recognized upon the occurrence of relevant events such as employee resignations and retirements that occur prior to year end that have not yet been paid with expendable available financial resources. These amounts are reported in the fund from which the employees who have accumulated leave are paid.

Sick leave is accumulated without limit for each employee at the rate of one day for each month worked. Leave with pay is provided when employees are absent for health reasons; however, the employees do not gain a vested right to accumulated sick leave. Employees are never paid for any sick leave balance at termination of employment or any other time. Therefore, the value of accumulated sick leave is not recognized as a liability in the District's financial statements. However, credit for unused sick leave is applicable to all classified school members who retire after January 1, 1999. At retirement, each member will receive .004 year of service credit for each day of unused sick leave. Credit for unused sick leave is applicable to all certificated employees and is determined by dividing the number of unused sick days by the number of base service days required to complete the last school year, if employed full-time.

### Accrued Liabilities and Long-Term Obligations

All payables, accrued liabilities, and long-term obligations are reported in the government-wide financial statements. In general, governmental fund payables and accrued liabilities that, once incurred, are paid in a timely manner and in full from current financial resources are reported as obligations of the funds.

However, claims and judgments, compensated absences, special termination benefits, and contractually required pension contributions that will be paid from governmental funds are reported as a liability in the fund financial statements only to the extent that they are due for payment during the current year. Bonds, capital leases, and long-term loans are recognized as a liability on the fund financial statements when due.

### Deferred Issuance Costs, Premiums, Discounts and Defeasance Costs

In the government-wide financial statements and in the proprietary fund type financial statements, long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs and defeasance costs are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the straight line method.

### **Fund Balance Reserves and Designations**

The District reserves those portions of fund equity which are legally segregated for a specific future use or which do not represent available expendable resources and therefore are not available for appropriation or expenditure. Unreserved fund balance indicates that portion of fund equity which is available for appropriation in future periods. Fund equity reserves have been established for revolving cash accounts, stores inventories, prepaid expenditures (expenses), and legally restricted grants and entitlements.

Designations of fund balances consist of that portion of the fund balance that has been designated (set aside) by the governing board to provide for specific purposes or uses. Fund equity designations have been established for economic uncertainties, and other purposes.

### **Net Assets**

Net assets represent the difference between assets and liabilities. Net assets invested in capital assets, net of related debt consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowings used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the District or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, or laws or regulations of other governments. The District applies restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available.

### **Operating Revenues and Expenses**

Operating revenues are those revenues that are generated directly from the primary activity of the proprietary funds. For the District, these revenues are food service sales and in district contributions to the internal service fund. Operating expenses are necessary costs incurred to provide the good or service that are the primary activity of the fund. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating revenue and expenses.

#### Interfund Activity

Transfers between governmental and business-type activities on the government-wide statements are reported in the same manner as general revenues.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2010

Exchange transactions between funds are reported as revenues in the seller funds and as expenditures/expenses in the purchaser funds. Flows of cash or goods from one fund to another without a requirement for repayment are reported as interfund transfers. Interfund transfers are reported as other financing sources/uses in governmental funds and after non-operating revenues/expenses in proprietary funds. Repayments from funds responsible for particular expenditures/expenses to the funds that initially paid for them are not presented on the financial statements. Interfund transfers are eliminated in the governmental and business-type activities columns of the statement of activities, except for the net residual amounts transferred between governmental and business-type activities.

### **Estimates**

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

#### **Budgetary Data**

The budgetary process is prescribed by provisions of the California Education Code and requires the governing board to hold a public hearing and adopt an operating budget no later than July 1 of each year. The District governing board satisfied these requirements. The adopted budget is subject to amendment throughout the year to give consideration to unanticipated revenue and expenditures primarily resulting from events unknown at the time of budget adoption with the legal restriction that expenditures cannot exceed appropriations by major object account.

The amounts reported as the original budgeted amounts in the budgetary statements reflect the amounts when the original appropriations were adopted. The amounts reported as the final budgeted amounts in the budgetary statements reflect the amounts after all budget amendments have been accounted for. For budget purposes, onbehalf payments by the State for PERS have not been included as revenue and expenditures as required under generally accepted accounting principles.

### **Property Tax**

Secured property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of January 1. Taxes are payable in two installments on November 1 and February 1 and become delinquent on December 10 and April 10, respectively. Unsecured property taxes are payable in one installment on or before August 31. The County of Santa Clara bills and collects the taxes on behalf of the District. Local property tax revenues are recorded when received.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2010

### **New Accounting Pronouncements**

In March 2009, the GASB issued GASB Statement No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions. The objective of this Statement is to enhance the usefulness of fund balance information by providing clearer fund balance classifications that can be more consistently applied and by clarifying the existing governmental fund type definitions. This Statement establishes fund balance classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which a government is bound to observe constraints imposed upon the use of the resources reported in governmental funds. The requirements of this Statement are effective for the financial statements for periods beginning after June 15, 2010. Early implementation is encouraged.

#### Policies and Practices

The District is authorized under California Government Code to make direct investments in local agency bonds, notes, or warrants within the State; U.S. Treasury instruments; registered State warrants or treasury notes; securities of the U.S. Government, or its agencies; bankers acceptances; commercial paper; certificates of deposit placed with commercial banks and/or savings and loan companies; repurchase or reverse repurchase agreements; medium term corporate notes; shares of beneficial interest issued by diversified management companies, certificates of participation, obligations with first priority security; and collateralized mortgage obligations.

Investment in County Treasury - The District is considered to be an involuntary participant in an external investment pool as the District is required to deposit all receipts and collections of monies with their County Treasurer (Education Code Section 41001). The fair value of the District's investment in the pool is reported in the accounting financial statements at amounts based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by the County Treasurer for the entire portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by the County Treasurer, which is recorded on the amortized cost basis.

### Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates. The District manages its exposure to interest rate risk by investing in the county pool and other investment pools and having the Pool purchase a combination of shorter term and longer term investments.

Credit risk is the risk that an issuer of an investment will not fulfill its obligation to the holder of the investment. This is measured by the assignment of a rating by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization. ### Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits

This is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a policy for custodial credit risk for deposits. However, the California Government Code requires that a financial institution secure deposits made by State or local governmental units by pledging securities in an undivided collateral pool held by a depository regulated under state law (unless so waived by the governmental unit). The market value of the pledged securities in the collateral pool must equal at least 110 percent of the total amount deposited by the public agency. California law also allows financial institutions to secure public deposits by pledging first trust deed mortgage notes having a value of 150 percent of the secured public deposits and letters of credit issued by the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco having a value of 105 percent of the secured deposits. As of June 30, 2010, District bank balances of \$31,254 were exposed to custodial credit risk because it was uninsured and collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent, but not in the name of the District.

### **Defeased Bonded Debt**

The District has defeased various bond issues by creating separate irrevocable trust funds through the years. New debt has been issued and the proceeds have been used to purchase U. S. government securities and placed in trust funds. The investments and fixed earnings from the investments are sufficient to fully service the defeased debt until the debt is called or matures. For financial reporting purposes, the debt has been considered defeased and therefore, removed as a liability from the District's Long Term Obligations. As of June 30, 2010, the total amount of defeased debt outstanding but removed from the Long-Term Obligations is \$102,605,533.

### OPEB (Other Post Employment Benefit) Revenue Bond

The District issued the bonds to refinance the District's obligation to pay certain healthcare and retirement benefits for certain retired District employees and to pay the costs of issuance of the Bonds. The Bonds are not subject to debt limitations of the California Constitution and principal of and interest on the Bonds is payable from any source of legally available funds of the District, including amounts on deposit in the General Fund of the District.

### **Equipment Leases**

The District borrowed funds to purchase a VOIP system and Solar Panel installation in the amount of 24,378,576. ### NOTE 10 - POSTEMPLOYMENT HEALTH CARE PLAN AND OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (OPEB) OBLIGATION

### Plan Description

The Postemployment Benefit Plan (the "Plan") is a single-employer defined benefit healthcare plan administered by the East Side Union High School District. The Plan provides medical insurance benefits to eligible retirees. Benefits currently are offered to employees who attain age 55 with at least 20 years of service. For grandfathered employees benefits are offered for lifetime where as under the new plan agreements which cover the majority of the plan beneficiaries, benefits are offered until age 65. Classified employees who retired before July 1, 1994 and other employees who retired before September 1, 1990 receive spousal benefits. Membership of the Plan based on actuarial information consists of 529 retirees and beneficiaries currently receiving benefits and 1,291 active plan members. The Plan is presented in these financial statements as the Retiree Benefits Trust Fund. Separate financial statements are not prepared for the Trust.

#### **Contribution Information**

The contribution requirements of plan members and the District are established and may be amended by the District and the East Side Teacher Association (ESTA) and the local California Service Employees Association (CSEA). The required contribution is based on projected pay-as-you-go financing requirements, with an additional amount to prefund benefits as determined annually through the agreements between the District, ESTA, and CSEA. In the current year the District's contribution was only in the form of a pay-as-you-go in the amount of \$3,055,501.

### Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation

The District's annual other postemployment benefit (OPEB) cost (expense) is calculated based on the annual required contribution of the employer (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Statement No. 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial accrued liabilities (UAAL) (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years. The following table shows the components of the District's annual OPEB cost for the year, the amount actually contributed to the plan, and changes in the District's net OPEB obligation to the Plan:

### **Funded Status and Funding Progress**

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, investment returns, mortality, and the healthcare cost trend. Amounts determined regarding the funded status of the Plan and the annual required contributions of the employer are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedule of funding progress, presented as required supplementary information following the notes to the financial statements, presents multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits. ### **Actuarial Methods and Assumptions**

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and the plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

In the May 1, 2008 actuarial valuation, the entry age normal method was used. The actuarial assumptions included a 5 percent investment rate of return (net of administrative expenses), based on the plan being funded in an irrevocable employee benefit trust invested in a combined equity and fixed income portfolio. Healthcare cost trend rates ranged from an initial 4 percent to an ultimate rate in line with general inflation (3%). The UAAL is being amortized at a flat dollar amount method. The remaining amortization period at June 30, 2010, was 24 years. The actuarial value of assets was not determined in this actuarial valuation. As of June 30, 2010, the Trust held net assets in the amount of \$17,890,259, all of which were invested with the Self Insured Schools of California (SISC) GASB 45 Trust, in which the majority of the amounts are invested in mutual funds.

#### **NOTE 11 - RISK MANAGEMENT**

### Property and Liability

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees and natural disasters. During fiscal year ending June 30, 2010, the District contracted with Northern California Regional Liability Excess Fund for property and liability insurance coverage. Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the past three years. There has not been a significant reduction in coverage from the prior year.

### Workers' Compensation

For fiscal year 2010, the District participated in the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group, an insurance purchasing pool. The intent of the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group is to achieve the benefit of a reduced premium for the District by virtue of its grouping and representation with other participants in the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group. The workers' compensation experience of the participating districts is calculated as one experience and a common premium rate is applied to all districts in the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group. Each participant pays its workers' compensation premium based on its individual rate. A participant will then either receive money from or be required to contribute to the "equity-pooling fund." This "equity pooling" arrangement insures that each participant shares equally in the overall performance of the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group. Participation in the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group is limited to districts that can meet the Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group selection criteria.

#### Claims Liabilities

The District records an estimated liability for its self-insured health benefit programs. Claims liabilities are based on estimates of the ultimate cost of reported claims (including future claim adjustment expenses) and an estimate for claims incurred, but not reported based on historical experience.

#### **Unpaid Claims Liabilities**

The Internal Service fund establishes a liability for both reported and unreported events, which includes estimates of both future payments of losses and related claim adjustment expenses. ### NOTE 12 - EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

Qualified employees are covered under multiple-employer retirement plans maintained by agencies of the State of California. Certificated employees are members of the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and classified employees are members of the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS).

### **CaISTRS**

#### Plan Description

The District contributes to the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS); a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by CalSTRS. The plan provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and survivor benefits to beneficiaries. Benefit provisions are established by State statutes, as legislatively amended, within the State Teachers' Retirement Law. CalSTRS issues a separate comprehensive annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. Copies of the CalSTRS annual financial report may be obtained from CalSTRS, 7919 Folsom Blvd., Sacramento, CA 95826.

### **Funding Policy**

Active plan members are required to contribute 8.0 percent of their salary and the District is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The actuarial methods and assumptions used for determining the rate are those adopted by CalSTRS Teachers' Retirement Board. The required employer contribution rate for fiscal year 2009-2010 was 8.25 percent of annual payroll. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established by State statute. The District's contributions to CalSTRS for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2010, 2009, and 2008, were \$9,153,575, \$9,773,349, and \$9,834,843, respectively, and equal 100 percent of the required contributions for each year.

#### **CalPERS**

#### Plan Description

The District contributes to the School Employer Pool under the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS); a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by CalPERS. The plan provides retirement and disability benefits, annual cost-of-living adjustments, and survivor benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. Benefit provisions are established by State statutes, as legislatively amended, within the Public Employees' Retirement Laws. CalPERS issues a separate comprehensive annual financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. Copies of the CalPERS' annual financial report may be obtained from the CalPERS Executive Office, 400 P Street, Sacramento, CA 95811.

### **Funding Policy**

Active plan members are required to contribute 7.0 percent of their salary and the District is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The actuarial methods and assumptions used for determining the rate are those adopted by the CalPERS Board of Administration. The required employer contribution rate for fiscal year 2009-2010 was 9.709 percent of covered payroll. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established by State statute. The District's contributions to CalPERS for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2010, 2009, and

2008, were \$2,901,685, \$3,168,168, and \$3,222,593, respectively, and equal 100 percent of the required contributions for each year.

### Social Security

As established by Federal law, all public sector employees who are not members of their employer's existing retirement system (CalSTRS or CalPERS) must be covered by social security or an alternative plan. The District has elected to use the Social Security as its alternative plan. Contributions made by the District and an employee vest immediately. The District contributes 6.2 percent of an employee's gross earnings. An employee is required to contribute 6.2 percent of his or her gross earnings to the pension plan.

#### On Behalf Payments

The State of California makes contributions to CalSTRS on behalf of the District. These payments consist of State General Fund contributions to CalSTRS in the amount of \$4,733,348, \$5,351,098, and \$5,381,771 (4.267 percent of annual payroll for 2010, and 4.517 percent for 2009 and 2008, respectively, of annual payroll) for the years ending June 30, 2010, 2009 and 2008, respectively. Under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, these amounts are to be reported as revenues and expenditures. These amounts have been recorded in the financial statements, but they are not included in the budgeted revenues and expenditures of the District. These amounts have been excluded from the computation of the available reserves percentage.

### NOTE 13 - PARTICIPATION IN PUBLIC ENTITY RISK POOLS, JOINT POWERS AUTHORITIES AND OTHER RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The District is a member of Northern California Regional Liability Excess Fund JPA (Nor-Cal Relief), Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group (SCCSIG) and Metropolitan Education District (MED). The District pays an annual premium to the North California Regional Liability Excess Fund for its property liability insurance and Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group for its workers' compensation coverage. In addition, the Metropolitan Education District operates the vocational classes for the District. The relationships among the District, the pools and the JPA's are such that they are not component units of the District for financial reporting purposes.

These entities have budgeting and financial reporting requirements independent of member units and their financial statements are not presented in these financial statements; however, fund transactions between the entities and the District are included in these statements. Audited financial statements are generally available from the respective entities.

The District has appointed one board member to the governing board of Metropolitan Education District.

During the year ended June 30, 2010, the District made payments of \$1,198,489, \$4,399,688 and \$1,217,796 to North California Regional Liability Excess Fund, Santa Clara County Schools Insurance Group and Metropolitan Education District, respectively.

### **NOTE 14 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES**

#### Grants

The District received financial assistance from Federal and State agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and are subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Any disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of the general fund or other applicable funds. However, in the opinion of management, any such disallowed claims will not have a material adverse effect on the overall financial position of the District at June 30, 2010.

#### Litigation

The District is involved in various litigation arising from the normal course of business. There are several pending civil suits against the District, of which one is an appeal to the Superior Court of California. The maximum exposure of the District is the deductible of \$2,574,877. This amount has been accrued as a legal liability as of June 30, 2010.

The General Fund balance has decreased by \$8,223,179 over the past two years. The fiscal year 2010-2011 budget projects a decrease of \$2,443,477 on the ending fund balance. For a district this size, the State recommends available reserves of at least 3 percent of total General Fund expenditures, transfers out, and other uses (total outgo).

The District has incurred two operating deficits in the past three years and anticipates incurring an operating deficit during the 2010-2011 fiscal year. Total long-term obligations have increased by \$112,354,284 over the past two years.

Average daily attendance has decreased by 27 over the past two years. A decrease of 70 ADA is anticipated during fiscal year 2010-2011.

#### Criteria or Specific Requirements

General best accounting practices emphasize the importance of good internal controls. Strong internal controls over accounts payable disbursement process ensures proper safeguarding of the District's cash and ensures proper payments are made for proper District expenditures.

#### Condition

During our walkthrough of internal controls, we noted that the District did not reconcile the printed checks provided by the Information Technology Department against the invoices by someone independent from the Accounts Payable department to ensure that checks were disbursed for their related invoices. It was noted that someone independent from the Accounts Payable department did reconcile the total of the cash disbursed to the total invoices but did not do it on an invoice by invoice basis.

#### **Ouestioned** costs

None

#### Context

All checks processed through the Accounts Payable department which averages to about 150 checks per week.

#### Effect

Lack of such verification would enable a perpetrator to process a payment for non District related expenditures and deposit that check into a personal accounts.

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the District reconcile the checks printed by the Information Technology Department by an accountant independent of the accounts payable department to ensure that checks disbursed are for approved district invoiced expenditures.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FINDINGS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

#### **District Response**

The account analyst independent of accounts payable staff is matching and sending out printed checks for payment requests without purchase orders currently. The District will assign account technicians or account analysts independent of accounts payable staff to reconcile all printed checks for all payments with or without purchase orders.

#### Criteria or Specific Requirements

General best accounting practices emphasize the importance of good internal controls. Strong internal controls over associated student body (ASB) funds are especially important due to the decentralized nature of ASB cash collections and disbursements.

#### Condition

#### Piedmont High School

- Ticket Control Sheets are not adequate and significant overages/shortages were noted between the cash collected and the number of tickets sold.
- No revenue potential forms were prepared
- Approvals were missing on some of the disbursements authorizations.

#### Evergreen High School

 It was noted that the site deposited some District lease of facilities funds in the study body account.

#### Questioned costs

None

#### Context

All ASB cash collections and disbursements related to the ASB accounts.

#### Effect

Lack of proper documentations for the ASB activities exposes ASB receipts and disbursements to a greater risk of misstatement and cause difficulty in verifying that all cash collected was deposited to the bank accounts intact and all cash disbursed was paid for the authorized purposes. In addition, the District's lease of facilities funds could end up being blended with the study body funds and spent on non District authorized expenses.

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the District provide training to the sites on the importance of strengthening the internal controls over ASB funds. Fund raising activities should have proper controls. Sales summaries should indicate how many tickets were sold and for how much each ticket was sold for. Reconciliations between how much should be collected from the sale of those tickets versus how

much was collected should be performed for all major fundraisers. The invoices should be reconciled properly to the disbursements and purchase orders should be maintained properly. All checks should be signed by two authorized personnel. In addition, the District should enforce a policy of having all site cash collections properly deposited into the District account rather than student body funds.

#### **District Response**

The district has had a couple of webinars and meeting conferences in 2009/10. We will plan to have refresher workshops two to three times annually. We will remind site principals to send all donations and lease of facilities funds be sent in the District Office to deposit in the county treasurer account. We will ask the District's internal auditor to include in his scope of work sampling of ASB deposits and facilities use fees. The District is in the process of creating bank clearing accounts for the deposits of site/district receipts which will make the separation from ASB accounts more controllable. We have also drafted an ASB accountability manual with the procedures to be followed for fundraising activities and is awaiting approval by the cabinet.

# FEDERAL AWARD FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

The following findings represent significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, and/or material instances of noncompliance including questioned costs that are required to be reported by OMB Circular A-133. The findings have been coded as follows:

#### 2010-3 Code - 50000

#### Criteria or Specific Requirements

The District is required to report to the State the number of students served within the Special Education (CFDA 84.027, 84.173, 84.391 – ARRA and 84.392 – ARRA) program through a system referred to as the CASEMIS system. CASEMIS enrollment for Special Education program should be supported by current Individualized Education Program (IEP) forms.

#### Condition

Based on our testing, it appears that internal controls related to reporting for Special Education as IEP forms are either missing or gaps exist between IEP forms, which is the primary support for the number of students reported as special education student. However, we were able to perform alternative audit procedures to support the number of special education students by tracing them to the District's general attendance system.

#### **Questioned Costs**

None

#### Context

VTD tested a sample of 40 Special Education Student noted in CASEMIS student listing report. After reviewing student's files, Auditor noted that of the 40 students, 6 students did not have an IEP form completed that covered the 2010 fiscal year. Of the 40 students, 19 students had a gap between the dates of IEP forms. IEP forms are to be re-evaluated annually and it was noted in the 19 cases that re-evaluation was not performed on a timely manner.

#### **Effect**

The District may be providing Special Education services for students who do not qualify, and lack proper documentation to support eligibility of Special Education students.

#### Cause

Procedures to ensure that students are provided timely and complete IEP evaluations are not adequate.

# FEDERAL AWARD FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the District provide timely IEP evaluations for students who receive Special Education services.

#### District Response

The Special Services Department of East Side Union High School District has provided on an annual basis onsite in-services to Special Education staff and administration to impress upon them the importance of compliance with State and Federal law related to IDEA. Both coordinators and the program specialists were involved with these trainings.

In an attempt to monitor IEP annual review and educational benefit at each of the school sites, the District Office Special Services Department has designed with the approval of the Superintendent an IEP tracking matrix. The matrix was presented to principals with the expectation that it be implemented at all sites.

Program Specialists collect IEPs on a bi-weekly basis. Those IEPs are reviewed for accuracy and completeness. Some are returned to the school site for revision as necessary. The others are submitted to the Special Services registrar for input into CASEMIS in a timely manner. The Program Specialists create a list of the IEPs turned in at each school which is sent to the teachers who submitted IEPs, their site principal and special ed. coordinators indicating each IEP's status.

#### 2010-4 Code - 50000

#### Criteria or Specific Requirements

A student must meet the eligibility requirements for Title I (CFDA 84.010 and 84.389 – ARRA) programs in a targeted school program. The requirements are that the student qualifies as a low income student or the parents' education level is below high school level.

#### Condition

We sampled 40 students, 8 of which did not meet these requirements.

#### **Questioned Costs**

None, because effective July 1, 2010, all sites at the District are classified as schoolwide sites which allows the Title I services to be provided to all students at East Side.

# FEDERAL AWARD FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

#### Context

All students identified as receiving Title I assistance at Foothill and Oak Grove during fiscal year 2010. These were the only targeted assistance sites at the District in the 2010 fiscal year.

#### **Effect**

The District may be providing Title I services for students who do not qualify to receive those services.

The District will not be required to make any changes because effective 2010, all sites at the District are considered to be schoolwide sites which require no tracking for eligibility since all students at the site are qualified to receive Title I services.

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the District keeps accurate records of the student eligibility for Title I

#### **District Response**

During the 2009-10 audit, there were 8 students for whom we could not find a valid lunch form to indicate the students to be qualified for free/reduced lunch. The only explanation that we can arrive at is that during the course of the year, students enroll and withdraw from our schools and 1) the lunch form could be misplaced, 2) student was misidentified through our enrollment process at Title I.

Due to the fact that we are a PI district, there is a need to have accurate data to support our academic programs. Therefore, every effort is made to make sure that our student information system is updated with the most accurate data.

Moving forward, we've invested in a web based SI system and have trained our staff to maintain this system to prevent future lapses.

- Student Council minutes were not maintained on file and accordingly, we were unable to verify that expenditures were approved in the student body meetings.
- Approvals were missing on some of the disbursements authorizations
- No copies of the revenue potential forms were maintained and no adequate tickets control for the fundraising activities.
- The school does not maintain an inventory record for the store.

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the District provide training to the sites on the importance of strengthening the internal controls over ASB funds. Fund raising activities should have proper controls. Sales summaries should indicate how many tickets were sold and for how much each ticket was sold for. Reconciliations between how much should be collected from the sale of those tickets versus how much was collected should be performed for all major fundraisers. Inventory records should be maintained properly with item purchased in and sold. The invoices should be reconciled properly to the disbursements and purchase orders should be maintained properly. All checks should be signed by two authorized personnel. Student council minutes should be maintained properly with expenditure approvals.
