SCHOOL CLIMATE AND SAFETY

Positive Learning Environment

Silver Creek has a written discipline plan that was developed by staff and parents in accordance with district policy. The plan is mailed to parents at the beginning of each school year. There are various intervention plans in place to assist the students with specific problems. For example, the APA's office personnel work collaboratively with the school's Healthy Start Center to provide support to students with problems that are interfering with their ability to be successful in school. The Center provides access to social services, drug and alcohol counseling, gang intervention and student assistance services. A special Behavior Modification class is held on Saturdays for students with behavior or attendance issues; it serves to retain students in the system, yet corrects misbehavior and truancy. In surveys collected from students, parents and staff members Silver Creek has consistently been rated one of the safest campuses in the District.

DROPOUT RATE

Data reported regarding progress over the most recent three-year period toward reducing dropout rates include: grade 9-12 enrollment, the number of dropouts, and the one-year dropout rate listed in the California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS). The formula for the one-year dropout rate is (Grades 9-12 Dropouts/ Grades 9-12 Enrollment) multiplied by 100.

FACILITIES

Silver Creek opened its doors in 1969 with a capacity for about 1,800 students. Currently, we have 2,350 students, about the same number as we had at the end of 2003-04 year. Most of the campus classrooms have been modernized over the last several years. All science classrooms have been remodeled to provide students with a state-of-the-art learning environment. A new, two-story building housing additional science labs and classrooms for all students will be built in the next three years. Existing portable buildings will be removed when the new facility is completed. This building, as well as renovation of the tennis courts, upgrading of the alarm and bell systems, and planned improvements to the landscaping, are the result of the passage of a district wide bond election in 2002. We are proud of our school and eager to see the new changes.

Suspensions

Located in the Evergreen Valley area of San Jose, Silver Creek's staff and parents have high academic expectations of students. Silver Creek's goal is to assist every student in achieving his/her maximum potential. Every student is exposed to a rigorous curriculum, and graduates are prepared for college and/or the work place.

With a very diverse student population, Silver Creek High School provides special courses for students interested in legal studies, finance, accounting, computer applications, technology, international studies, the military and marketing. An AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) program provides students with the academic skills to succeed in college; this program also offers college information, tours and regular parent progress meetings. Advanced Placement (AP) and Honors courses are offered in English Language and Composition, English Literature, American Government, U.S. History, World History, European History, Human Geography, Spanish Language and Spanish Literature, Chemistry, Physics and Biology. Silver Creek staff, parents and students are proud of this nationally recognized program.

The number of students taking the AP tests, as well as taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests (PSAT, SAT) remains high. Almost all seniors attend a two-year or four-year college after graduation.
