SCHOOL CLIMATE AND SAFETY

Positive Learning Environment

Piedmont Hills has a written discipline plan that was developed in accordance with district policy. This plan is well publicized and is available to students, parents, staff, and community members. It is in the student/parent handbook.

Special programs have been developed by the school to encourage appropriate student behavior. These include the Pirate Assistance Program, the attendance recovery program, after-school detention, and Saturday School. The school continues to use the Multi-Service Team (MST) approach to helping students. Through the MST a number of community agencies and services are on campus to assist students and parents.

San Jose police officers are on campus every day to ensure student safety and there is a school safety team in place to monitor and evaluate campus safety.

DROPOUT RATE

FACILITIES

The school, located in the northeast foothills of San Jose, is a compact campus on 48 acres of a park like setting. The school houses more than 2,000 students from richly diverse cultural backgrounds. The school is currently undergoing modernization. A new theater has been built and classrooms have been modernized in two major areas of the campus. New roofs, carpets and heating and air-conditioning system were installed. The athletic fields were upgraded and lights have been installed. Electrical upgrades were made to accommodate the infusion of technology throughout the campus, and a new electronic marquee has been installed to promote school and community events.

The modernization of the campus will continue through the summer of 2005. At the end of this time all classrooms will be modernized. Portables will continue to be on the campus to house students while classrooms are reconstructed. A wrought iron fence will be placed around the perimeter of the campus to enhance security and lighting will be upgraded throughout the campus.

SCHOOL DESCRIPTION

Steeped in tradition, Piedmont Hills High School challenges students to set high academic and personal standards and supports them in their pursuit of success. The faculty is strongly committed to providing the highest quality educational program consistent with the expectation of the community. Many of the students enroll in post secondary education. Approximately 47% of the students meet 4-year college/university requirements and 46% attend 4year universities and 46% attend community colleges. Recent graduates have attended such prestigious colleges as MIT, Harvard, Stanford and all the University of California campuses. The school, located in the northeast foothills of San Jose, is a compact campus on 48 acres of a parklike setting. The school houses over 1,900 students from richly diverse cultural backgrounds. The school has an active school site council, a parent booster club, and various special program groups, e.g. band, drama, and athletics. In addition, the African American Parent Coalition, the Latino Parent Education Network, and the Filipino Parents and Student Association support specific ethnic groups.

LEADERSHIP

The staff at Piedmont Hills High School is very knowledgeable, talented and experienced. The staff is extremely well qualified and stable as in past years. Over 42% of the staff have advanced degrees. Piedmont Hills' teachers have an average of 21 years of teaching experience and 16 years at Piedmont Hills. The school leaders and staff have high expectations of all students. Excellence in education is emphasized and academic achievements are recognized. The high quality of instruction and leadership are reflected in the academic success of the students. Most Piedmont Hills High School students have a six-period day. Seventy-five percent of our courses meet UC/CSU requirements and this number will continue to increase over the next few years. Piedmont was named a "California Dstinguished school" in 2002.

The vocational classes in the business department and the Auto-CAD classes in industrial arts include state-of-the-art equipment and instruction, appealing to a diverse group of students. The business magnet includes two paths; one in applications which prepares students for administrative support work, and the other in entrepreneurship, preparing students to manage and work in their own or a small business. The program has recently been revamped to include instruction in graphic design and web page design. Piedmont Hills has one of the highest attendance rates in the District. This is an indication of the high quality of instruction and leadership. Our test scores as measured by the CAHSEE and the STAR/CAT-6 tests are also the highest in the district.
