Raw Comments

- Mt. Pleasant
 - ► Teachers are only available at 8 AM for 30 minutes which is not adequate. They were very sensitive to "Work to Rule".
 - Concern was expressed about relations with the Latino students.
 - Unacceptable use of the N-word
 - ► Too much Mexican influence
 - Black DJ for dances
 - Soul food for lunch
 - Need teachers who interact and help
 - Black nurse
 - Clean bathrooms
 - Front office staff is rude

Raw Comments (cont.)

- Independence
 - ▶ They have NO visible African American representation on campus
 - BSU coordinator is white male
 - Two boys abruptly removed.
 - Time was changed without notice.
 - No campus representation for issues dealing with race. Studnets feel it is useless to report due to lack of response and follow-up by school's administration
 - No college information
 - Schoolloop is ineffective. Teac hers not updating. Parent/students not following up.

Raw Comments (cont.)

Santa Teresa

- Students have reported to campus authorities about being called racial slurs with no perceived administrative support.
- They are receiving no college information, especially about HBCU's
- Schoolloop ineffective
- ➤ Some students feel like they are being judged or pre-judged by their race, dress and mannerism. Not given an opportunity to become better student because of not meeting the school norms.
- ▶ Inconsistent treatment of yard-duty workers of Black and Brown students. Treated with less tolerance regarding attire than Asian and White students.

Raw Comments (cont.)

Silver Creek

- Issues with "Work to Rule" Teacher Policy. No opportunity for lesson or homework follow-up. Affects time spent with students.
- ► Teachers not updating student green sheets in a timely manner. Students waiting over a year for updates. Requesting once a week updates.
- ▶ Student Dress Codes/Appearances. Causing drama. More focus than learning.
